Metaphysics

COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this course we will examine some of the major problems in (and about) metaphysics:

- (1) What is metaphysics?
- (2) The nature of time
- (3) The possibility of time travel
- (4) Personal identity
- (5) Fatalism
- (6) Free will and determinism
- (7) Possibility and necessity

We will start with discussing generally what metaphysics is, and hope to acquire a better understanding of the nature of metaphysics in this course by thinking about some particular metaphysical issues. There will be a lot of in-class discussions and a fair number of short writing assignments to encourage students to think about the issues.

TEXTS

Twenty six articles by different authors. Reading material will be posted on Blackboard Learn.

GRADING

Your course grade is based on the score you get out of a total of 200 points:

- (i) 30 points for attendance: you may miss 3 classes with no penalty; after that, you lose 1 points for each class you miss unless you have very good reason for missing that class.
- (ii) 40 points for 2 article-summaries [20 points each].
- (iii) 80 points for 8 in-class quizzes [10 points each]. A quiz consists only of multiple-choice questions on an article or book chapter assigned for reading.
- (iv) 50 points for a final paper of about 1,500 words.
